

The Opportunities & Challenges of Social Media -One of the historic challenges for municipalities has been finding effective ways to communicate consistently and clearly with the public. From complex construction projects, to simple matters, such as a short-term traffic disruption or promoting a public meeting, social media has become the definitive platform for municipal politicians and staff who wish to reach the greatest number of constituents in the shortest time possible. Presenters: Patrick Hirtle, the Communications Coordinator with the Town of Bridgewater, will discuss the opportunities and challenges associated with using social media as a go-to communications tool for municipalities; and Councillor Waye Mason, Halifax Regional Municipality. Councillor Waye Mason is no stranger to the internet. His social media presence is one of the most active of any Nova Scotian politician. This session will share some of his strategies for using social media to connect with voters and the media, including having empathy for trolls, understanding the culture and pace of different social media channels, and social media do's and don'ts.
